



The Newfoundland and Labrador Snowmobile Federation investing \$200,000 directly into trail development and enhancements this summer.

During our Presidents meeting this past weekend the Newfoundland and Labrador Snowmobile Federation (NLSF) announced that it would be investing \$200,000 dollars directly into trail development and enhancements this summer. Funds will be shared equally between all clubs across the island with \$30,000 going directly into bridging materials. Through fundraising efforts and the sale of local trail enhancement stickers most clubs generally match any funds from the NLSF dollar for dollar. This means potentially \$400,000 or more could be invested in our trail systems this summer.

With this investment, there's a substantial opportunity to make significant improvements to trail infrastructure and enhance the overall trail experience for both snowmobilers, ATV riders and all users. This plan also demonstrates a commitment by the NLSF to improve trail infrastructure and ensure that trails meet appropriate standards to allow grooming earlier with limited snow levels and to also allow for accessibility and safety for ATV riders and other trail users.

Investing in trail enhancements and development offers numerous benefits to snowmobilers, ATV riders, communities, or anyone using our trail system.

- Stay off the ice, including reservoirs and rivers near hydroelectric dams where ice is unstable.
